
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DACE NEWSLETTER

GETTING YOUR HIGH SCHOOL DIPLOMA AS AN ADULT

Going back to school is a big step towards one's future success. People go back to school for many reasons including career advancement, learning a new skill, and earning a certificate or diploma. Adults returning to school face many challenges including balancing life, work, and school commitments along with societal stressors and anxiety, but there are tools to help students manage these challenges. This quarter's focus on **Resilience and Adaptability** reminds us that these are essential skills for anyone embarking on a new challenge.

Getting a High School Diploma can create many future opportunities for students. It can lead to a promotion at work, entrance into college, or open the door to a career path that will generate many future financial benefits. Our High School Diploma program is free to students and is funded through the California Adult Education Program (CAEP).

A few simple strategies can help students build their Resilience and Adaptability over time.

- Define clear and simple goals and milestones and develop a plan to achieve those goals. By defining exactly what you want, it will be easier to reenergize and get back on track if you run into unexpected obstacles. Make sure to set realistic "success points" so that you can see and celebrate your accomplishments along the way. Instead of something big like "I want to get my high school diploma", try smaller goals like "I'm going to complete 5-credits within three months." Set calendar reminders on your phone to come to an Open Lab class or to remind yourself to get at least one assignment done each day. And most importantly, if you fall off the horse, it's okay! Just get back on your plan when you can and keep moving forward one baby step at a time.
- Manage your time effectively and consider all your other commitments. One of the hardest things to manage is life's unexpected time commitments. Your kid comes home sick from school or you find out that you have guests coming over for dinner so you have to make a quick run to the store. No matter how well we plan, we can't always plan for everything, but if we have a good sense of how we are using our time, it makes it easier to readjust our schedules to accommodate these unexpected interruptions and still find time to get our work done.

The old adage continues to hold true: If we fail to plan, we plan to fail, so make a plan to make things happen and don't let obstacles stand in your way.

Trivia Corner Did you know?

- THE MAJORITY (57%) OF STUDENTS ARE BETWEEN 18 AND 39 YEARS OF AGE, WHILE THE REMAINING STUDENTS ARE OVER 40.
- ACCORDING TO DATA FROM THE 2021-22 SCHOOL YEAR, WHICH IS INCLUDED TO THE RIGHT, THE TOP NATIVE LANGUAGES OF ESL STUDENTS ARE AS FOLLOWS: SPANISH 24%, KOREAN 16%, AND CHINESE 11%
- THE LARGEST PROGRAM IN TERMS OF ENROLLMENT IS THE COMMUNITY INTEREST PROGRAM, WHICH SERVES BETWEEN 900-1200 STUDENTS PER YEAR IN A VARIETY OF CLASSES.
 - THE MAJORITY OF STUDENTS (70%) ARE FEMALE.





WINTER RECIPE

Mexican Hot Chocolate



INGREDIENTS

6 cups of milk
1/2 cup of sugar
3 ounces of unseasoned chocolate, chopped
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
2 beaten eggs
2 teaspoons vanilla extract
whipped cream, to taste

DIRECTIONS

In a large saucepan combine 1 cup of the milk, the sugar, chocolate, and cinnamon.

Cook and stir over medium-low heat until chocolate is melted.

Gradually stir in remaining milk.

Cook and stir until milk is hot. Do not boil.

Gradually and slowly stir 1 cup of the hot milk mixture into eggs, then transfer entire mixture to saucepan.

Cook and stir for 2 minutes over low heat.

Remove from heat and stir in vanilla. Stir quickly until very frothy.

Pour hot chocolate into mugs and dollop with whipped cream.
